		Therefore, loft/roof areas were checked to ensure that compartment walls (that are common to two or more buildings) run the full height of the building up to the main roof structure and have no breaches.
		Breaches were identified in several areas of the roof/loft space. These were: -
		Noticeable gaps under the ridge, the main roof structure, running along the length of the building.
		Adjacent purlins where pipework has been removed by contractors.
		Instances where electrical cables have passed through brickwork.
		Breaches in existing compartmental wall shall be fire stopped using suitable products to achieve a minimum of 60 minutes fire compartmentation.

Introduction

The Regulatory Reform (Fire Safety) Order 2005 (RR(FS)O) places a legal duty on landlords to complete a fire risk assessment (FRA). Specifically, RR(FS)O article 9. — (1)

"The responsible person must make a suitable and sufficient assessment of the risks to which relevant persons are exposed for the purpose of identifying the general fire precautions he needs to take to comply with the requirements and prohibitions imposed on him by or under this Order".

This fire risk assessment has been written to comply fully with the above legislation which is enforced locally by West Midlands Fire Service. The date of the fire risk assessment is on the front page, followed by any subsequent reviews. A recurring time frame is not set in legislation, but the Council will as a minimum review:

- High Risk Residential Buildings annually
- Other Buildings every 3 years

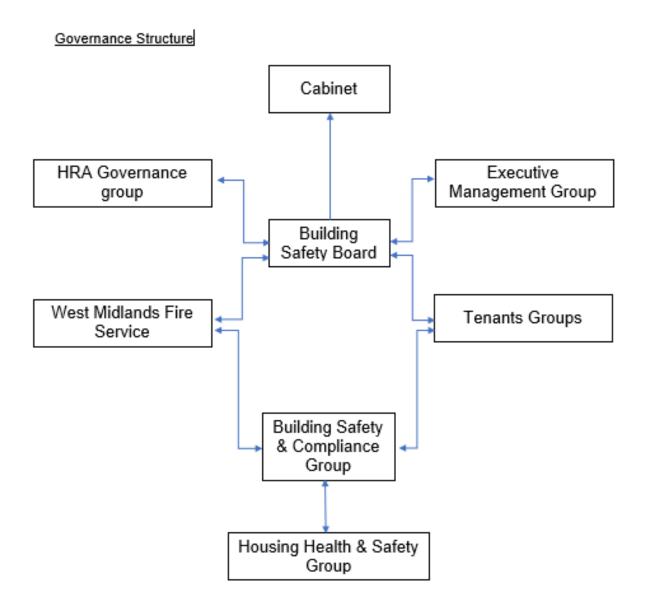
The council has procedures and policies in place that will trigger a review of the fire risk assessment. This then is recorded on the fire risk assessment if the review suggests the fire risk assessment is not currently suitable and sufficient, then a new fire risk assessment will be undertaken and become the current fire risk assessment. The previous fire risk assessment will be retained in the building safety case for that building.

The following diagrams illustrate those procedures and persons that support the effective planning, organisation, control, monitoring and review of the preventive and protective measures. This information is provided as required under the RR(FS)O.



The above processes and procedures are overseen by the Fire Safety, Manager who reports to the Head of Building Safety.

These managers attend the Building Safety and Compliance Group for scrutiny which is part of the governance structure below.



To summarise the fire risk assessment, in this scenario the RR(FS)O requires the prescribed information to be recorded. The prescribed information is the significant findings of the fire risk assessment and those groups or persons especially at risk from fire. This is recorded here in section 1. Also required to be recorded under article 11, are the fire safety arrangements for the planning, organisation, control, monitoring and review of the preventative and protective measures. The information shown above is part of this requirement.

1

Significant findings

The significant findings (executive summary) of the fire risk assessment include those measures that have been or will be undertaken by the responsible person in order to comply with the RR(FS)O 2005.

Groups of people especially at risk of fire include such people as remote or lone workers, at risk due to layout of the building, visitors, and contractors unfamiliar with the building layout as well as those with physical, sensory or mental health issues.

A third requirement that under the order must be recorded is the fire safety arrangements. This is the effective planning, organisation, control, monitoring and review of the preventive and protective measures. These are shown in the introduction.

Significant findings

Include a brief summary of protective and preventative measures where relevant along with any issues found.

The escape strategy is 'Stay Put Unless'. This means in the event of a fire in your flat you should evacuate. If there is a fire elsewhere in the building you should stay put unless you are affected by fire, smoke or you have been advised by the emergency services to leave.

Considering the fire prevention measures observed at the time of this risk assessment, it is considered that the hazard from fire (likelihood of fire) at these premises is:

In this context, a definition of	the above terms is as follows:
Low	Unusually low likelihood of fire because of negligible potential sources of ignition.

Considering the nature of the premises and the occupants, as well as the fire protection and procedural arrangements observed at the time of this fire risk assessment, it is considered that the consequences for life safety in the event of fire would be:

Comments:

In conclusion, the likelihood of a fire is at a medium level of risk prior to the implementation of the action plan because of the normal fire hazards that have been highlighted within the risk assessment.

This includes flat entrance doors which should be upgraded when the door replacement programme commences. Combustible items should not be left on the means of escape routes, these areas should be sterile. Both front & rear doors were wedged open at the time of the assessment. From a security and Arson understanding, this practice should cease, and all doors maintained as locked shut.

After considering the use of the premise and the occupants within the block, the consequences for life safety in the event of a fire would be slight harm.

A suitable risk-based control plan should involve effort and urgency that is proportional to risk. The following risk- based control plan is based on one that has been advocated for general health and safety risks:

Risk level	Action and timescale
Trivial	No action is required, and no detailed records need to be kept.
Tolerable	No major additional fire precautions required. However, there might be a need for reasonably practicable improvements that involve minor or limited cost.
Moderate	It is essential that efforts are made to reduce the risk. Risk reduction measures, which should take cost into account, should be implemented within a defined time period. Where moderate risk is associated with consequences that constitute extreme harm, further assessment might be required to establish more precisely the likelihood of harm as a basis for determining the priority for improved control measures.
Substantial	Considerable resources might have to be allocated to reduce the risk. If the premises are unoccupied, it should not be occupied until the risk has been reduced. If the premises are occupied, urgent action should be taken.
Intolerable	Premises (or relevant area) should not be occupied until the risk is reduced.

(Note that, although the purpose of this section is to place the fire risk in context, the above approach to fire risk assessment is subjective and for guidance only. All hazards and deficiencies identified in this report should be addressed by implementing all recommendations contained in the following action plan. The fire risk assessment should be reviewed regularly.)

People at Significant Risk of Fire

Persons at significant risk of fire does not just refer to those people with physical, sensory or mental health issues. It also includes those at risk due to the layout or features of the building such as inner rooms or deadend conditions. Persons may also be at risk due to remote or lone working.

The RR(FS)O requires that these people are identified in any fire risk assessment.

Sandwell Council takes the health, safety and wellbeing of its colleagues, contractors, residents and leaseholders seriously. It is our policy to exceed, where possible, the minimum health and safety requirements of the law.

Residents are responsible for letting us know whether they might need a Personal Emergency Evacuation Plan (PEEP). The Resident Engagement Officers (Fire Safety) will conduct an assessment visit upon request. Any risk-reduction measures that are found where a PEEP is necessary and completed will be documented and taken quickly.

With the consent of the resident, we will make a referral for West Midlands Fire Service to conduct a Safe and Well visit.

When a PEEP is in place, the relevant information will be kept in the secure Premise Information Box (High Rise Buildings only), which is set up to help WMFS in an emergency. The data is classified as level 1, which means it complies with the General Data Protection Regulations.

Description of Premises

Flats 1-3A and 4 – 6A Tame Road Horseley Heath Tipton, DY4 7HU.

Description of the Property:

The communal, any workplace areas and the external envelope of the building are subject to the Regulatory Reform (Fire Safety) Order 2005 as confirmed by the Fire Safety Act 2021.

The enforcing authority is West Midlands Fire Service.

This low-rise block of flats constitutes three storeys (inclusive of the ground floor), each of the floors contain 2 dwellings. They were constructed circa 1959.

They are of traditional brick, concrete construction, double glazed UPVC window frames surmounted by a pitched roof.









The blocks have two entrances; a main entrance to the front elevation and a further exit located on the rear elevation. Both front and rear entrances have door entry system with a fob reader installed.



The building has a single staircase with access gained at the front elevation. There is a rear door which can be accessed by residents through a side gate using a suited key. The rear door is secured and controlled by an electronic fob.



There is access to the communal roof space from the second floor landing area. This is maintained locked shut.



There is a ground floor electrical cupboard that contains electrical equipment for the building.





Residents utilise an external waste point/rubbish collection point located at the rear of the premise.







The rear of the gardens is secured by a combination of wooden fencing and hedges, there is an access gate fitted to enable refuse to be managed.

External envelope

Following the introduction of the Fire Safety Act 2021, consideration needs to be given to the external envelope of the building for any fire risk. This predominantly means the external wall construction including any insulation filler. It also includes balconies and any other fixtures as well as doors and windows.

Below is a breakdown of the materials used within the external envelope and, as part of the external wall system.

It is deemed that the combination and application of these materials presents an acceptable level of fire risk.

1) The external envelope of the premise is predominantly traditional brick, concrete construction, UPVC double glazed window frames surmounted by a pitched tiled roof.









2) Access is gained to all flats from the ground floor using the main access door leading to the staircase area.







- 3) There is no provision for off road car parking facilities for residents outside of the building.
- 4) An external waste area is provided for residents at the rear of the premises. This appeared to be well managed with no excess waste visible.







5) The rear gardens are secured by a combination of wooden fencing and garden hedges.







Means of Escape from Fire

1) The building has a staircase that provides the means of escape. All staircases are of adequate width (at least 850mm) and should be maintained clear to that width as a minimum.







- 2) The only communal door within the block are the final exit doors, these are fitted with automatic closing devices that are checked on a regular basis by caretaker teams as part of their daily checks. Defective closing devices are reported to an external contractor.
- 3) The final exit doors have door entry systems installed. These systems are designed to fail safe i.e., door unlocked in the event of a power failure. This prevents residents being locked in or out of the building.
- 4) Communal areas should be kept free of flammable items. The communal areas should be checked on a regular basis by Caretaking / Cleaning teams and all items of rubbish removed.
- 5) Generally, the means of escape corridors/areas were clear. There were limited artificial flower displays and some minor decoration in the means of escape area, these items should be removed. (Email sent to housing to have items removed).







6) It was noted that one flat entrance door (Flat 1) had a floral display. These items should be removed with other associated artificial displays in the means of escape area. (Email sent to housing to have items removed).







7) It was noted there were other combustibles and refuse that had had been left on the means of escape routes.





8) Automatic smoke ventilation is not employed, landing windows are openable and can be used for mechanical/forced ventilation if necessary.





9) The means of escape are protected to prevent the spread of fire and smoke with a combination of nominal FD30s doors mainly consisting of timber front doors. Where applicable, timber flat entrance doors should be replaced when the fire door replacement programme commences.









10) No internal access to flats was gained during the fire risk assessment to ensure the doors have not been tampered with by residents etc.

The resident at flat number 1A provided information on the flat entrance door. This door has been replaced and it was noted that the self-closer had been renounced. This was due to a medical condition /disability at the address. A compromise needs to be sought and the self-closer re-established at the earliest opportunity.

This appeared to be the same for Flat number 1. However, no one was home at the time of the assessment to enquire why the self-closer had been dis-established.





11) The electrical cupboard for the building is located on the ground floor, it opens onto the means of escape corridor. This cupboard has been modified, no issues to report.

Fire Detection and Alarm Systems

- Early warning is limited to hard wired or battery smoke alarms within each of the resident's flats. The equipment is subjected to a cyclical test.
- 2) During the assessment, the assessor spoke with the resident at number 1A who confirmed that smoke alarms are installed in the Hallway, Living room & Kitchen.
 - Flat 2A is currently an empty property. Work was being carried out by service engineers; the assessor entered the property to confirm that a battery-operated smoke alarm is fitted in the kitchen. No other smoke alarms are fitted in this premise.
- 3) Based on the sample of properties accessed during the fire risk assessment, the smoke alarms within resident's flats are installed to a mixture of LD2 & LD3 Standard.

For information

LD1 all rooms except wet rooms.

LD2 all-risk rooms e.g., Living Room, Kitchens and Hallway.

LD3 Hallway only.

- 4) There is no effective means for detecting an outbreak of fire to communal areas. The reason for this is: -
 - I. Such systems may get vandalised.
 - II. False alarms would occur.
 - III. A Stay Put Unless policy is in place.

Emergency Lighting

1) Emergency lighting is provided throughout the communal landings/staircases. This is tested at frequent intervals and is compliant with BS 5266.



Compartmentation

The high degree of fire separation between flats and the common parts is achieved by making each flat a fire-resisting enclosure. This is known as compartmentation. A compartment is simply a part of a building bounded by walls and floors that will resist the passage of fire for a specified period of time. The fire resistance of this construction is such that, normally, a fire will burn itself out before spreading to other parts of the building.

- The building is designed to provide as a minimum 1-hour vertical fire resistance and 1-hour horizontal fire resistance around flats. All flat entrance doors are 30-minute notional/nominal doors, including those in 1-hour rated walls.
- 2) There is access to the roof space from the second floor landing area. It should be noted that the roof void was not assessed at the time of the inspection. A date will be agreed where the Assessor will meet the trades team at the premise to carry out a survey of the Roof void.



- 3) The premises have sufficient compartmentation to limit the travel and effect of smoke and flame in event of a fire in communal areas due to the design of the building.
- 4) The fire stopping / compartmentation of the premises is subject to an annual inspection by the Fire Safety Rapid Response Team.
- 5) The building has sufficient passive controls that provide effective compartmentation to support a Stay Put -Unless policy. Therefore, residents are advised to remain in their flat unless the fire directly affects them or if they are advised to evacuate by the emergency services.

6) Generally, the means of escape is protected from flats with the use of nominal rated timber doors. These doors should be upgraded to FD30's when the door replacement programme commences.









7) There is a flat entrance door (Flat 5A) that has received some significant damage. This flat entrance door should be replaced the earliest opportunity. (See observations).

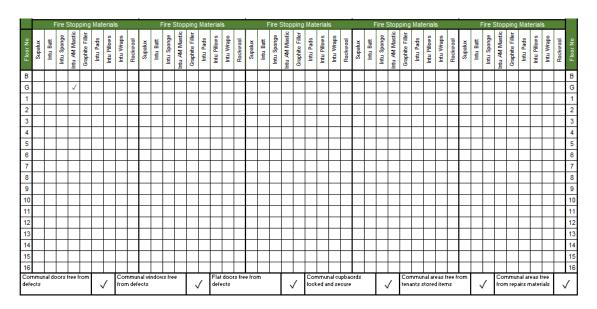


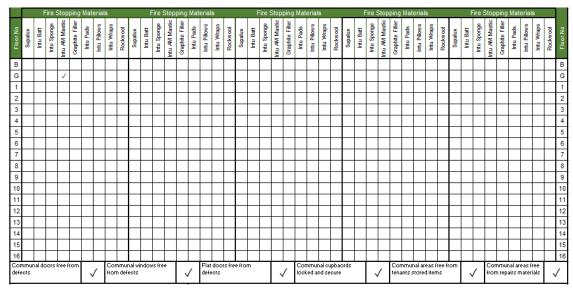
8) There are store cupboard doors adjacent to flat entrance doors; some doors have been upgraded, as part of any future works consideration should be given to replacing the remaining store cupboard doors.



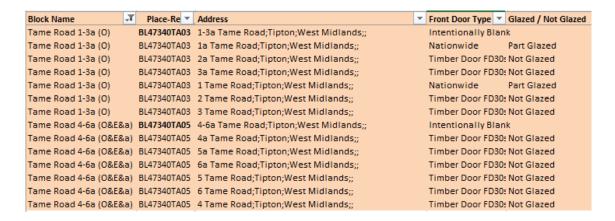


9) A variety of methods / materials have been used to achieve firestopping, refer to table(s) below.





10) All front doors appear to be nominal fire door rated FD 30's. Refer to the sheet below.



It is accepted that, in older blocks, fire doors, particularly flat entrance doors, do not meet current test standards for FD30S doors. However, these doors may still be acceptable if the doors remain in good condition, and they met the relevant standards at the time of construction of the block.

Fire Fighting Equipment

1) Currently, there is no fire-fighting equipment installed at these premises.

Section 12

Fire Signage

- 1) Any communal fire doors display "Fire Door Keep Shut" where appropriate.
- 2) The fire escape routes are self-evident and therefore additional fire action notices are not required.
- 3) No smoking (Smoke Free England) signage is displayed at the front entrance to the premises.



Employee & Resident Training/Provision of Information

- 1) All Caretaking / Cleaning Employees have undertaken fire safety training. This includes use of bespoke 'Fire Safety in High / Low Rise Flatted Accommodation' Video.
- 2) All employees are encouraged to complete 'In the line of fire' training on an annual basis.
- Caretaking Teams are not currently trained in the effective use of fire extinguishers. Caretaking Teams are not expected to tackle fires in this area.
- 4) Employees within the Neighbourhoods Directorate assigned to undertake Fire Safety Inspections have received IFE approved training via West Midlands Fire Service.
- 5) Staff undertaking fire risk assessments are qualified to or working towards Level 4 Diploma in Fire Risk Assessment.
- 6) Fire safety information has been provided as part of tenancy pack. Information regarding the Stay Put Unless fire evacuation strategy is provided to tenants.





Section 1 1

Sources of Ignition

- 1) Smoking is prohibited within any communal parts of the building in line with Smoke Free England legislation.
- 2) Hot working is not normally conducted. If essential maintenance requires the use of hot work processes, then corporate policies and procedures are to be followed.
- 3) The fixed electrical installation should be tested every 5 years, all electrical systems were in date of the 5-yearly inspection. The last 5-yearly inspection was carried out on 20/12/2021.
- 4) Portable electrical equipment used as part of the Caretaking / Cleaning regime is subject to annual PAT Testing. This information is held by the Estate Services Manager Bryan Low.
- 5) Portable heaters are not allowed in any common parts of the premises.
- 6) Gas appliances and pipework (where installed) are subject to annual testing and certification. This cyclical contract is managed by the inhouse Gas Team.
- 7) As per tenancy agreements, flammable liquids or gas cylinders should not be stored on site.

Waste Control

- 1) Refuse containers are emptied at regular intervals.
- 2) 'Out of Hours' service in place to remove bulk items.

Control and Supervision of Contractors and Visitors

- Responsive Repairs service delivered by Sandwell MBC necessitates the production of an order via the computerised repairs system. Details of any known risks are documented on the repair order.
- 2) Owing to the nature of low-rise flatted accommodation it is difficult to manage/control individual contractors/utility companies.
- 3) Hot works are not permitted unless authorisation is given via the approved officer. The hot works procedure is to be followed.
- 4) Utility companies are not allowed to access any service cupboard or secure area. They must request and collect maintenance keys from the Investments office @ Roway Lane. This allows scrutiny of what is the scope of any works such as installation of tenant's broadband / phone line etc.
- 5) Where contractors are appointed to undertake major refurbishment works, Sandwell MBC Urban Design team will put control measures in place. Such Measures include:
 - a) Pre-Contract Meetings where contractor is made aware of all working arrangements and safe systems of work to be adopted. Issues covered in this meeting will include:
 - Health and Safety.
 - · Site security.
 - Safety of working and impact on children/school business.
 - Fire risk, if any.
 - Site Emergency plan.
 - b) Monthly Site Meetings to monitor, review and share any new information including any new risks.
 - c) Site monitored daily whilst work is in progress by Clerk of Works / Health and Safety Officers.
 - d) Final Contractor review on completion of works undertaken.

Arson Prevention

- 1) Regular checks are undertaken by Caretakers / Cleaning Team(s) 365 days per year which helps reduce the risk of arson.
- 2) Access to the flats is restricted by a door entry system.
- 3) There have been no reported fire incidents since the last FRA.
- 4) From an Arson and security point of view both front and rear access doors to the premise had been wedged open. This practice should cease to prevent any unauthorised access and the possibility of an Arson attack. (Email sent to Housing Manager foe remedial action).





Storage Arrangements

- 1) Residents are instructed not to bring L.P.G cylinders into block. This information is contained within the tenants' handbook.
- 2) The tenancy conditions, Section 7 Condition 5.6 stipulates "If you live in a flat or maisonette, you, people living with you and any visitors to your property must not keep or use paraffin oil, petrol, bottled gas appliances or any other explosive, FLAMMABLE or dangerous material in the property. This restriction also applies to any storage facility situated in or attached to the block, which has been provided for your use."
- 3) No Flammable liquids stored on site by Caretakers / Cleaners.
- 4) All store cupboards are kept locked, it appears that store cupboard doors have been replaced.
- 5) As per tenancy agreements, flammable liquids or gas cylinders should not be stored on site.

Observations

Upon a recent visit to carry out a Fire Risk Assessment at Tame Road it was noted that significant damage had occurred to the front entrance door of Flat 5A. Access to Flat 5A could not be gained at the time of the assessment. At this time the door was temporary repaired. The repairs team are aware, and the issue is ongoing and being dealt with by repairs team.



As part of any future upgrades or when the door replacement programme commences, replace timber flat entrance doors for FD 30s.



Access to the roof space could not be gained at the time of the assesmsent. A future date will be agreed where the Assessor will meet the trades team at the premise to carry out a survey of the Roof void. Consideration should be given to reducing the amount of trees/shrubs outside the front elevation of flats 4 - 6A.

Some store cupboard doors have been upgraded, as part of any future works consideration should be given to replacing the remaining store cupboard doors.

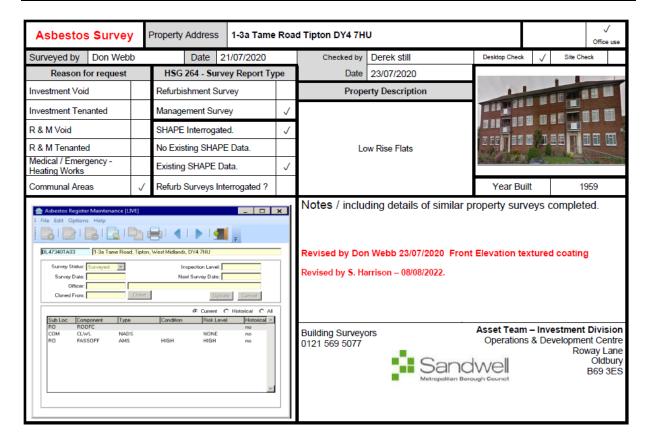
